ZEPHANIAH Faith In His Promise

Promise of Judgement Zephaniah 1:1-18 Lesson 1


Background Information

Decades before the fall of Jerusalem, the prophet Zephaniah came on the scene. His ministry played a significant role in preparing Judah for the revivals that took place during the reign of the nation's last righteous king, Josiah. He became king of Judah at the age of eight, and by the age of sixteen his heart had already begun to turn toward God. He attempted to tear down all of the altars of Baal and turn the hearts of the people back to God. Though Josiah initiated outward reform, it never got to the heart of the people. It was only a surface change, and the people went along with it because the king promoted it and the people went along with whatever was popular. As soon as Josiah was gone, the people reverted to their idolatry and evil ways.

The main message speaks of "the day of the Lord". Though it applies historically to the invasion of Babylon in 606 B.C., prophetically, it speaks of a future day of wrath at the end of the age. Zephaniah saw both the wrath and the mercy of God. He announced that judgment would come to Judah, Jerusalem and the gentile nations, but mercy was promised to those who would repent and turn back to God. The one ray of hope that the prophet offered, was that those who would listen, would heed and obey the warning.

Zephaniah means "hidden in the Lord", a name that relates to the principal message the prophet presented. Zephaniah traces his lineage back four generations to Hezekiah. This is most likely King Hezekiah, the King of Judah. If this is the case; he is the greatgreat-grandson of the godly King Hezekiah, and the only prophet to have royal descent.

The message to us is especially timely today, as we see the end of the age nearing. We can almost hear the prophets voice resounding around us, "Seek the Lord while there is still time!"





What does it say?

The first step is getting the lay of the land. **Carefully observe the text** looking to see where you might dig to find hidden treasure. **Mark your text** looking for repeated words, contrasts or similarities. Look for answers to, Who? What? When? Where? Why or How?

Zephaniah 1:1-3

1 The word of the LORD which came to Zephaniah the son of Cushi, the son of Gedaliah, the son of Amariah, the son of Hezekiah, in the days of Josiah the son of Amon, king of Judah.

2 "I will utterly consume everything from the face of the land," Says the LORD; 3 "I will consume man and beast; I will consume the birds of the heavens, The fish of the sea, And the stumbling blocks along with the wicked. I will cut off man from the face of the land," says the LORD.



Digging Deeper

Dig deeper using other resources such as a dictionary, concordance, maps and cross-references. Notate where you found it to share with the group. Look for commands to obey or questions to be answered. **What does God want you to know about Himself**?

Zephaniah 1:4-13

4 "I will stretch out My hand against Judah, And against all the inhabitants of Jerusalem. I will cut off every trace of Baal from this place, The names of the idolatrous priests with the [pagan] priests-- 5 Those who worship the host of heaven on the housetops; Those who worship and swear [oaths] by the LORD, but who [also] swear by Milcom; 6 Those who have turned back from [following] the LORD, and have not sought the LORD, nor inquired of Him."

7 Be silent in the presence of the Lord GOD; For the day of the LORD [is] at hand, For the LORD has prepared a sacrifice; He has invited His guests. 8 "And it shall be, In the day of the LORD's sacrifice, That I will punish the princes and the king's children, and all such as are clothed with foreign apparel. 9 In the same day I will punish All those who leap over the threshold, who fill their masters' houses with violence and deceit. 10 "And there shall be on that day," says the LORD, "The sound of a mournful cry from the Fish Gate, A wailing from the Second Quarter, And a loud crashing from the hills. 11 Wail, you inhabitants of Maktesh! For all the merchant people are cut down; All those who handle money are cut off. 12 "And it shall come to pass at that time [That] I will search Jerusalem with lamps, and punish the men Who are settled in complacency, who say in their heart, 'The LORD will not do good, nor will He do evil.' 13 Therefore their goods shall become booty, and their houses a desolation; They shall build houses, but not inhabit [them]; They shall plant vineyards, but not drink their wine."



Zephaniah 1:14-18

14 The great day of the LORD [is] near; [It is] near and hastens quickly. The noise of the day of the LORD is bitter; There the mighty men shall cry out. 15 That day [is] a day of wrath, a day of trouble and distress, a day of devastation and desolation, a day of darkness and gloominess, a day of clouds and thick darkness, 16 a day of trumpet and alarm against the fortified cities and against the high towers. 17 "I will bring distress upon men, and they shall walk like blind men, because they have sinned against the LORD; their blood shall be poured out like dust, and their flesh like refuse." 18 Neither their silver nor their gold shall be able to deliver them in the day of the LORD's wrath; but the whole land shall be devoured by the fire of His jealousy, for He will make speedy riddance of all those who dwell in the land.
