UNCOMPROMISING FAITH

... the just shall live by his faith Habakkuk 2:4




Background Information

The circumstances of life sometimes appear to contradict God's revelation of Himself concerning His power and purposes. Habakkuk struggles with his faith when he saw men seem to thrive though they flagrantly violate God's law and distort justice without fear of divine intervention. The prophet cried out the troubling question of his heart, "Why would God allow this flagrant, iniquity to go unpunished?"

Habakkuk understood that he needed a right perspective in order to *rest and wait* in God's strength. He wasn't afraid to wrestle with the issues that were meant to test and strengthen his faith. He openly and honestly directs his problems to God and waits to see how He will respond. The more we know about the Planner the more we can trust in His timing, and His plan. The key to trusting when all does not seem right in the world is found in God's words to the prophet, *the just shall live by his faith*. This is not a blind faith that just believes that all will be set right, in your own eyes. This speaks of a faith rooted and grounded in God's Word, Who He is and His power to perform what He speaks.

God's answer leads Habakkuk to the conclusion that, even in the worst circumstances, God's plan is always perfect. His infinite wisdom, goodness and power, will stand against anything that comes against its ultimate fulfillment. In spite of appearances to the contrary, God is still on the throne as the Ruler of the Nations. Though He may be slow to wrath, all iniquity will eventually be punished, He is worthy of our trust.





What does it say?

The first step is getting the lay of the land. Carefully observe the text looking to see where you might dig to find hidden treasure. Mark your text looking for repeated words, contrasts or similarities. Look for answers to, Who? What? When? Where? Why or How?

Habakkuk 2:1-8

1 I will stand my watch And set myself on the rampart, And watch to see what He will say to me, And what I will answer when I am corrected.

2 Then the LORD answered me and said: "Write the vision And make [it] plain on tablets, That he may run who reads it. 3 For the vision [is] yet for an appointed time; But at the end it will speak, and it will not lie. Though it tarries, wait for it; Because it will surely come, It will not tarry.

4 "Behold the proud, His soul is not upright in him; But the just shall live by his faith.

5 "Indeed, because he transgresses by wine, [He is] a proud man, And he does not stay at home. Because he enlarges his desire as hell, And he [is] like death, and cannot be satisfied, He gathers to himself all nations And heaps up for himself all peoples.

6 "Will not all these take up a proverb against him, And a taunting riddle against him, and say, 'Woe to him who increases [What] is not his--how long? And to him who loads himself with many pledges'? 7 Will not your creditors rise up suddenly? Will they not awaken who oppress you? And you will become their booty. 8 Because you have plundered many nations, All the remnant of the people shall plunder you, Because of men's blood And the violence of the land [and] the city, And of all who dwell in it.



Digging Deeper

15 "Woe to him who gives drink to his neighbor, Pressing [him to] your bottle, Even to make [him] drunk, That you may look on his nakedness! 16 You are filled with shame instead of glory. You also--drink! And be exposed as uncircumcised! The cup of the LORD's right hand [will be] turned against you, And utter shame will be on your glory. 17 For the violence [done to] Lebanon will cover you, And the plunder of beasts [which] made them afraid, Because of men's blood And the violence of the land [and] the city, And of all who dwell in it.

18 "What profit is the image, that its maker should carve it, The molded image, a teacher of lies, That the maker of its mold should trust in it, To make mute idols? 19 Woe to him who says to wood, 'Awake!' To silent stone, 'Arise! It shall teach!' Behold, it is overlaid with gold and silver, Yet in it there is no breath at all. 20 "But the LORD is in His holy temple. Let all the earth keep silence before Him."


