Ignorant Commander

Judges 11:1-40 Lesson 11

Introduction

Though Jephthah was one of Israel's judges, he was the people's choice, much like Saul. The text calls Jephthah a *mighty man of valor*, a man of military skill and personal strength. It is the same phrase God used for Gideon. God called Gideon a *mighty man of valor* for the potential He saw in him, but Jephthah earned the name for himself. Valor is not just military in nature, but can refer to a person of strength and influence who has good standing in the community. His rise to prominence is depicted as the result of the hidden providence of God at work to deliver his people from their oppressors amid the sins and maneuverings of human beings. Jephthah found himself impowered by the Spirit of God for the deliverance of His people from their enemies. However, before he went out he tried to strike a bargain with God, by an ignorant vow. Jephthah's vow was an attempt to manipulate God in his favor.

Jephthah - Though a son of Gilead, he was the son of a harlot. He may have been half-Canaanite, conceived by a temple prostitute. He lived in a culture given over to the combined worship of many gods.

Ammonite – The god of the Ammonites was Molech. Ammon and Moab lived side by side and shared a common heritage. Both nations having descended from Lot, shared cultural and religious ideas. The favor of the gods could be bought by human sacrifice and other detestable acts.

Chemosh – Is the god of the Moabites, though Ammon also worshiped him. He is said to bring victory in battle.

Ignorance of God's Word, can be dangerous and have tragic consequences. God's law prohibits human sacrifice (Deut. 12:31), and also makes provision for a vow rashly uttered (lev 5:4-6). Jephthah, though familiar with Israel's history, appears to be ignorant of God's ways, to his own hurt. Those who do not understand the character of God as revealed in scripture, can find themselves the victim of circumstances of their own ignorance. Dan. 11:32 says "the people who know their God shall be strong, and carry out great exploits." In applying this verse to Jephthah's situation, the verse becomes, "the people who are ignorant of God will display stupidity and wreak havoc." -Gary Inrig He may have been passionate in his attempt to honor God with his vow, but he was passionately wrong. Timothy Keller points out that "God wants only one kind of human sacrifice, the self-sacrifice of offering God the lordship of every area in our lives."

Looking for Gold - What does it say?

Setting the scene: Read Lev. 5:4-6, Deut. 12:29-32, Micah 6:6-8 for added insight. Use an atlas or other sources to place the cities in the appropriate place on your map. Pay attention to who's inheritance they are occupying.

Judges 11:1-11

1 Now Jephthah the Gileadite was a mighty man of valor, but he was the son of a harlot; and Gilead begot Jephthah. 2 Gilead's wife bore sons; and when his wife's sons grew up, they drove Jephthah out, and said to him, "You shall have no inheritance in our father's house, for you are the son of another woman." 3 Then Jephthah fled from his brothers and dwelt in the land of Tob; and worthless men banded together with Jephthah and went out raiding with him.

4 It came to pass after a time that the people of Ammon made war against Israel. 5 And so it was, when the people of Ammon made war against Israel, that the elders of Gilead went to get Jephthah from the land of Tob. 6 Then they said to Jephthah, "Come and be our commander, that we may fight against the people of Ammon."

7 So Jephthah said to the elders of Gilead, "Did you not hate me, and expel me from my father's house? Why have you come to me now when you are in distress?"

8 And the elders of Gilead said to Jephthah, "That is why we have turned again to you now, that you may go with us and fight against the people of Ammon, and be our head over all the inhabitants of Gilead."

9 So Jephthah said to the elders of Gilead, "If you take me back home to fight against the people of Ammon, and the Lord delivers them to me, shall I be your head?"

10 And the elders of Gilead said to Jephthah, "The Lord will be a witness between us, if we do not do according to your words." 11 Then Jephthah went with the elders of Gilead, and the people made him head and commander over them; and Jephthah spoke all his words before the Lord in Mizpah.

Judges 11:12-28

12 Now Jephthah sent messengers to the king of the people of Ammon, saying, "What do you have against me, that you have come to fight against me in my land?"

13 And the king of the people of Ammon answered the messengers of Jephthah, "Because Israel took away my land when they came up out of Egypt, from the Arnon as far as the Jabbok, and to the Jordan. Now therefore, restore those lands peaceably."

14 So Jephthah again sent messengers to the king of the people of Ammon, 15 and said to him, "Thus says Jephthah: 'Israel did not take away the land of Moab, nor the land of the people of Ammon; 16 for when Israel came up from Egypt, they walked through the wilderness as far as the Red Sea and came to Kadesh. 17 Then Israel sent messengers to the king of Edom, saying, "Please let me pass through your land." But the king of Edom would not heed. And in like manner they sent to the king of Moab, but he would not consent. So Israel remained in Kadesh. 18 And they went along through the wilderness and bypassed the land of Edom and the land of Moab, came to the east side of the land of Moab, and encamped on the other side of the Arnon. But they did not enter the border of Moab, for the Arnon was the border of Moab. 19 Then Israel sent messengers to Sihon king of the Amorites, king of Heshbon; and Israel said

to him, "Please let us pass through your land into our place." 20 But Sihon did not trust Israel to pass through his territory. So Sihon gathered all his people together, encamped in Jahaz, and fought against Israel. 21 And the Lord God of Israel delivered Sihon and all his people into the hand of Israel, and they defeated them. Thus Israel gained possession of all the land of the Amorites, who inhabited that country. 22 They took possession of all the territory of the Amorites, from the Arnon to the Jabbok and from the wilderness to the Jordan.

23 'And now the Lord God of Israel has dispossessed the Amorites from before His people Israel; should you then possess it? 24 Will you not possess whatever Chemosh your god gives you to possess? So whatever the Lord our God takes possession of before us, we will possess. 25 And now, are you any better than Balak the son of Zippor, king of Moab? Did he ever strive against Israel? Did he ever fight against them?
26 While Israel dwelt in Heshbon and its villages, in Aroer and its villages, and in all the cities along the banks of the Arnon, for three hundred years, why did you not recover them within that time? 27 Therefore I have not sinned against you, but you wronged me by fighting against me. May the Lord, the Judge, render judgment this day between the children of Israel and the people of Ammon.'" 28 However, the king of the people of

Ammon did not heed the words which Jephthah sent him.

Judges 11:29-40

29 Then the Spirit of the Lord came upon Jephthah, and he passed through Gilead and Manasseh, and passed through Mizpah of Gilead; and from Mizpah of Gilead he advanced toward the people of Ammon. 30 And Jephthah made a vow to the Lord, and said, "If You will indeed deliver the people of Ammon into my hands, 31 then it will be that whatever comes out of the doors of my house to meet me, when I return in peace from the people of Ammon, shall surely be the Lord's, and I will offer it up as a burnt offering."

32 So Jephthah advanced toward the people of Ammon to fight against them, and the Lord delivered them into his hands. 33 And he defeated them from Aroer as far as Minnith — twenty cities — and to Abel Keramim, with a very great slaughter. Thus the people of Ammon were subdued before the children of Israel.

Jephthah's Daughter

34 When Jephthah came to his house at Mizpah, there was his daughter, coming out to meet him with timbrels and dancing; and she was his only child. Besides her he had neither son nor daughter. 35 And it came to pass, when he saw her, that he tore his clothes, and said, "Alas, my daughter! You have brought me very low! You are among those who trouble me! For I have given my word to the Lord, and I cannot go back on it."

36 So she said to him, "My father, if you have given your word to the Lord, do to me according to what has gone out of your mouth, because the Lord has avenged you of your enemies, the people of Ammon." 37 Then she said to her father, "Let this thing be done for me: let me alone for two months, that I may go and wander on the mountains and bewail my virginity, my friends and I."

38 So he said, "Go." And he sent her away for two months; and she went with her friends, and bewailed her virginity on the mountains. 39 And it was so at the end of two months that she returned to her father, and he carried out his vow with her which he had
